Of particular success was our CRM system, based on the Salesforce platform for which we receive free licenses to use, which continues to allow us to work efficiently and to operate at a level most organisations would require significantly more personnel to achieve. Indeed the results achieved by the charity in 2016 were accomplished with a team of just 4 full time and 2 part time members.

Our supporters continue to allow us to do such great work by donating and performing all manner of amazing feats to fundraise. The vast majority of our funding to date has come from individuals across the UK, without whom the charity would be unable to continue. During 2016 we also benefited from significant support from The Sun newspaper whose Christmas Appeal led to large donations from both Morrisons and M&S.

We are also grateful to the Trustees of The Undentable Trust who kindly donated a holiday home following the decision to wind up their own charity.

Nikki's drive and passion for providing the very best support to our bereaved Forces children remains as strong and as focused as ever. Having shared a similar experience she is in the unique position of fully understanding the needs of our beneficiaries.

The number of beneficiaries we support has continued to grow and our improved communications has also led to increased engagement with existing Scotty Members. Take up of our holiday breaks, events and grant schemes has been higher than ever.

### Assistance Programmes

Help to our bereaved British Forces children is delivered through 3 key Assistance Programmes.



Scotty's Little Soldiers offers assistance to This help is provided through our three children aged 0-19 years who have suffered Assistance Programmes; the loss of a parent serving in the British Armed Forces.

This support is tri-service, meaning that bereaved children & young people from Army, • Navy or RAF families can benefit as can those from Regular or Reserve forces.

Deaths out of service but directly related to the • parents' time in the military are also included. The rise in levels of PTSD amongst personnel returning from conflict has sadly led to an increase in those taking their own lives. Scotty's is on hand to help children who lose a parent in this way.

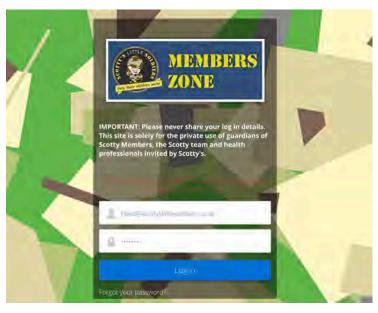

Our current SUPPORT Programme includes referral partnership with bereavement specialists Winston's Wish. All Scotty Members have access to professional bereavement counselling in a project which is funded by Help for Heroes.

In addition to counselling we have developed an exclusive web portal for families. The Members Zone is a one stop shop of information and support. It features a guardian forum where surviving parents offer support and advice to one another, access to all the activities provided by Scotty's Little Soldiers including details of all the grants available and online holiday bookings.

Our plans for developing SUPPORT in the next few years are huge. We have identified the need for a dedicated Support Manager. Someone trained to provide advice in times of distress, highlight additional support available and champion the needs of bereaved Forces families in the wider community.

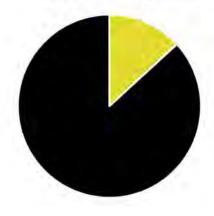

For 2016 our Fundraising Ratio, a formula often used to calculate how efficient charities are in their fundraising, was just 13.2%. 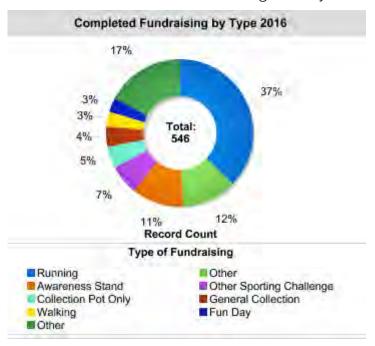

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### TRUSTEE REPORT

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) published on 16 July 2014.

### Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects are to provide relief from the effects of bereavement to young people up to and including the age of 18 who have suffered the loss of a parent whilst serving with the armed forces of the crown and there has been no change in these during the year.

### Vision:

'We want every bereaved British Forces child to have access to the very best emotional support, outstanding development opportunities and the chance to smile again'

### Objectives:

- 1. To provide relevant and genuinely beneficial support to bereaved British Forces children which has a profoundly positive impact on their future lives.
- 2. To make this support available to as many bereaved British Forces children as possible.
- 3. To build a respected and sustainable charity which is able to fulfil objectives 1 & 2 for as long is required by our beneficiaries.

### Review of charitable activities and achievements for the public benefit

The charity's aim is to provide relief from the effects of bereavement to young people who have lost a serving parent in the British Armed Forces.

This relief is provided through 3 assistance programmes; Smiles; Support and Strides.

Smiles provides opportunities for bereaved Forces children to smile again through fun based activities such as holiday breaks, group events, gifts and vouchers and special experiences.

The Support programme aims to deal with the more emotional side of bereavement and provides access to professional bereavement counselling provided by partners Winston's Wish in a project funded by Help for Heroes.

The Strides programme is designed to offer beneficiaries assistance with their personal development and includes a range of activity and educational grants.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake.

During the year the charity, as well as using employees and the trustees to promote charity donations and fundraising events, also rely on many volunteers and fundraisers in order to provide donations to the charity and arrange fundraising events for which proceeds are then donated to Scotty's Little Soldiers. The income is only recognised by Scotty's Little Soldiers at the time the donation is made although all individuals and groups fundraising in aid of the charity are encouraged to register their activity. Thank you letters are arranged to be sent out to fundraisers of the charity.

The charity has not engage with any third-party professional fundraisers.

### Achievements and performance

### Main achievements of charity during the year

- Provided direct support to 270 bereaved British Forces children and young people and their families.
- Dispatched over 1,000 gifts and vouchers during the year for anniversaries such as birthdays, Christmas, the death of their parent or Remembrance.
- Organised an exclusive magical weekend Christmas event for 155 beneficiaries with travel expenses and overnight accommodation included.
- Opened the 6th Scotty Lodge at the Rockerly Park Holiday Centre in Sussex and provide respite breaks to 265 beneficiaries.
- Covered £14,025 worth of costs for bereaved Forces families to attend support events and activities.
- Sent 235 gift vouchers at the anniversary of a child's parent death and 268 family meal vouchers at Remembrance.
- · Provided £16.023 in small grants including:
  - 103 Scotty Allowance grants.
  - 2 Higher Education Grants.
  - 7 Driving Lesson Grants.
  - 3 Super Grants

#### Financial review

### Review of the financial position of the charity and reserves policy

Financially the organisation is healthy and we are meeting our objectives and targets set. The Trustee Board have agreed a Reserves policy in line with the organisation objectives that all reserves shall be applied solely towards promotion of the object of the charity. In the event of dissolution of the charity the reserves would be first used for severance payments and winding up costs. The constitution states that any surplus must be either used directly for the objects of the charity, be transferred to another charity with like objects or in any other manner approved by the Charity Commission. The present level of reserves held is £998,715 which includes £563,986 of tangible assets and £308,693 in cash reserves available to use. £991,873 of the reserves held are categorised as unrestricted funds, £6,842 are categorised as restricted funds.

### Principal sources of income and how expenditure meets objectives

The principal sources of income is that of donations received through collections and fundraising. These sources of income been used in the year to support the key objectives of the charity as outlined in this trustees report.

# TRUSTEE REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

#### Risk Management

The Trustees has assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

The Trustees have a risk management review which comprises

- · a continuing review of the risks the charity may face;
- · the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those identified risks and
- the implementation of procedures designed to minimise the potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise.

### Plans for the future

- Further increase the charity's presence within the Armed Forces charity sector and develop relationships other leading charities operating within the sector.
- Focus on developing the SUPPORT Programme including a project to recruit a Family Support Manager and to organise a therapeutic weekend camp.
- · Develop our income streams by recruiting at least one dedicated Fundraising member of staff.
- Focus on Corporate and Community fundraising channels and converting existing supporters into regular donors.

# TRUSTEE REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The senior official to whom the day to day management of the charity is delegated by the charity Trustees is Stuart Robinson and co founder Nikki Scott.

Mr J Robinson has signaled his intention to stand down as a Trustee at the end of 2017.

The Trustees have engaged our legal team at Stone King, to advise on moving the charity from a Trust to an incorporated Charity. This work will take place during 2017 and will see a new CIO body established which will be better placed to take the charity forward in the best interests of its beneficiaries.

### Appointment of new Trustees

The charity has a formal Trustee Recruitment policy and process. New Trustees positions can be advertised by the charity or nominations from the management team and the existing Trustees can be put forward. Those nominated and appointed are elected at the first AGM following appointment.

Once the new CIO is established the Trustees have acknowledged a desire to add additional skills to the new board and a recruitment process will take place at this point in time.

### Trustees induction and training

When considering nominations of Trustees the requirement for any specialist skills needed are reviewed.

Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events when these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

New Trustees attend an orientation meeting to brief them on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the various committees and decision making processes, the financial plan and recent financial performance of the charity. During this initial orientation programme they meet key employees and other Trustees.

The remuneration of the senior officials of the charity is decided and agreed unanimously by the board of trustees, and is felt to accurately reflect their level of service and dedication to the charity whilst they promote the charity's objectives as outlined in the trustees report.

### Organisation

The charity is administered by a committee containing up to 5 and no less than 3 Trustees . This committee meets 4 times per year.

To facilitate effective operations the senior official and the management team has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the Trustees, for operational matters including finance and employment. The Management team report frequently to the Trustees, usually on a monthly basis via written reports and conference calls.

No preference dividends were paid. The directors do not recommend payment of a final dividend.

# TRUSTEE REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

### Related parties

As a charity originally founded by family members and close friends the Trustees of Scotty's Little Soldiers have, in association with the Charity Commission, created a 'Conflicts of Interest Policy' which ensures any potential conflicts of interest are highlighted and transparent.

- The Founder of the Charity, Mrs Nikki Scott, and the Chief Executive of the Charity, Mr Stuart
  Robinson are both related to the Trustee, Mr John Robinson. As per the Charity's Conflicts of Interest
  policy, Mr Robinson is excluded from discussions and decisions regarding the employment and
  remuneration of both Mrs Scott and Mr Robinson. Mr J Robinson will stand down as a Trustee at the
  end of 2017.
- Mrs Nikki Scott, Mr John Robinson and Mr Stuart Robinson are listed as Directors of the Limited
  Trading Company Scotty's Little Soldiers Trading Ltd. This company was created to sell merchandise
  on behalf of the Charity, the profits from which are all donated to the Charity. No dividends or salaries
  are taken from the Limited Company. Upon completion of the incorporation project the new CIO will
  take full ownership of this trading company.
- No Trustees were reimbursed for their personal expenses during 2016.

Statement of Trustee responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustee Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the Charity for that year.

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

### 1 Accounting policies

### **Charity information**

Scottys Little Soldiers is a unincorporated charity.

### 1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's [governing document], the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\mathfrak{L}$ .

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016 are the first accounts of Scottys Little Soldiers prepared in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 January 2015. The reported financial position and financial performance for the previous period are not affected by the transition to FRS 102.

### 1.2 Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

The Charity has a restricted income fund to account for situations where a donor or grant provider requires that a donation or grant must be spent on a particular purpose or where funds have been raised for a particular purpose. All other funds are unrestricted income funds.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the Charity.

### 1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

### 1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred. Contractual arrangements and performance related grants are recognised as goods or services are supplied. Other grant payments are recognised when a constructive obligation arises that results in the payment being unavoidable.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in trading activities that raise funds.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with the constitutional and statutory requirements.

### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

### Capitalisation of fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are capitalised at original cost of acquisition. Donated tangible fixed assets which do not have a cost to the Charity are capitalised at their current value at the date of donation.

Lodges

4% straight line basis.

Lodge and office equipment

25% reducing balance basis

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

### 1.8 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the stocks to their present location and condition. Items held for distribution at no or nominal consideration are measured the lower of replacement cost and cost.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

### 1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

#### 1.10 Financial instruments

The Charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Charity's balance sheet when the Charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

### 1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

#### 1.12 Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, are charged to income on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease.
